The arabic world is famous for having produced the richest corpus of literary works before the introduction of the printing press. But what about the documentary texts, like letters, contracts, tax accounts, recording the details of daily life? Some 150 000 arabic documents have been preserved in the sands of Egypt and come to complement our knowledge that we have from literary sources. Although these texts are often difficult to read, in recent years more scholars started contributing to their publication, and historians regularly include them in their research.

This workshop addresses advanced students of Arabic and Islamicate studies (BA, MA or early PhD) who dare to dive into late antiquity and the early middle ages. Knowledge of arabic script is required, but no papyrological skills.

The APWorkshop continues the tradition of the Arabic Papyrology Webclass, (http://www.naher-osten.lmu.de/apw) which, since 2007, introduces students from all around the world to the joys and sorrows of arabic papyrology. This summer, we opted to meet physically in Munich, as we already did for a first workshop in January 2020.

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

## **TOPICS**

We will ask how the arabic papyri made their way to collection in Vienna, Berlin etc., and what were the research interests of the scholars involved. We speak of "clusters" because our papyri are often so small that they only make sense when we puzzle several of them together to form a a group, archive or document cluster. This can be achieved by comparing personal names, formal similarities, handwriting, and also by looking at the acquisition history.

But these will only be two topics among others. We will present the methods and tools that papyrologists might use, both printed and electronic, including of course the Arabic Papyrology Database which is operating from Munich (<a href="www.naherosten.lmu.de/apd">www.naherosten.lmu.de/apd</a>). And most of all, we will learn by doing, i.e. by reading papyri.
